eyes and gesture, makes it a compelling piece that invites the viewer to ponder the story behind the image.

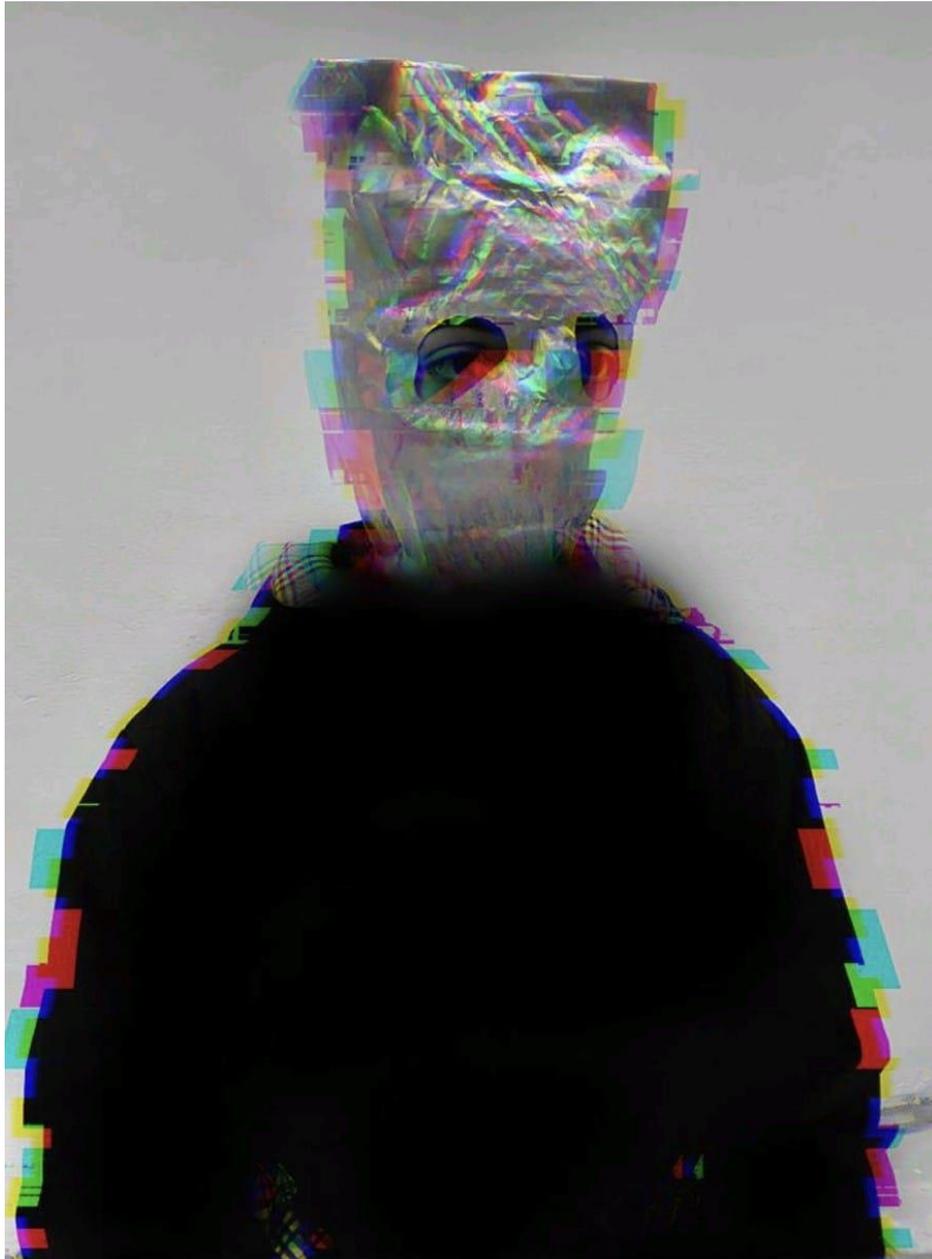


Figure 7: The Pixelated Mask
